Music Notes:

Our worship begins and ends with Noëls by French organists. Claude Louis Balbastre (1729-1798) was a French organist, harpsichordist and composer. Famous for his Noëls, so many people came every year to Saint Roch at Midnight Mass that the Archbishop of Paris had to prohibit him from playing, because of the noise. Balbastre sets "Joseph is well married" in a set of variations that use many sounds of the organ.

The blind German organist and composer Helmut Walcha (1907-1991) setting of "Quem pastores" calls for high-pitched flute stops, giving the work a charmingly light texture.

"Greensleeves" is our Sabbath playlist piece for this week. Richard Purvis (1913-1994) is remembered for his expressive recordings of the organ classics and his own lighter compositions for the instrument. "Greensleeves" was composed in a foxhole under enemy fire during WWII.

After a grand introduction, Alexander Guilmant (1837-1911) offers four short variations on the Polish carol, "Infant Holy, Infant Lowly."
